

**EATON COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS
PUBLIC SAFETY COMMITTEE
MINUTES OF JANUARY 14, 2021**

Present: Chairman Commissioner Tim Barnes, Vice-Chairman Commissioner Wayne Ridge, Commissioner Brian Droscha, Commissioner Brandon Haskell, Commissioner Mark Mudry, Commissioner Dairus Reynnet and Commissioner Jane Whitacre

The Public Safety Committee met in a virtual session on January 14, 2021, as permitted by PA 228 of 2020. The members made an announcement of the location from which they are attending remotely as follows:

Commissioner Reynnet, their residence in the Village of Dimondale, Eaton County, MI
Commissioner Haskell, their residence in Delta Township, Eaton County, MI
Commissioner Droscha, their residence in Eaton Township, Eaton County, MI
Commissioner Whitacre, their residence in Delta Township, Eaton County, MI
Commissioner Mudry, their residence in Delta Township, Eaton County, MI

Chairperson Barnes called the meeting to order at 4:00 p.m.

The Pledge of Allegiance was given by all.

Commissioner Whitacre moved to approve the agenda, as presented. Commissioner Haskell seconded. Motion carried by unanimous roll call.

Sheriff Reich highlighted the major incidents that occurred in December 2020.

Chief Deputy Morris reported that the Maple Valley School District is interested in contracting with the Sheriff's Office to provide a School Resource Officer for the remainder of the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 school year. This District has contracted for these services in the past, however due to financial uncertainty has not entered into a contract for the current school year and proposes a contract for the remainder of the school year with a \$375 per diem rate for school resource officer services. Discussion held.

Commissioner Haskell moved to recommend approval of the inter-local agreement of police services with the Maple Valley School District to the Board of Commissioners. Commissioner Whitacre seconded. Motion carried with a unanimous roll call vote.

Animal Control Officer Becky Neal was present to request authorization to apply for a non-profit organization animal sterilization grant. Discussion held.

Commissioner Barnes moved to recommend approval of the animal control sterilization grant, for an amount of up to \$20,000 to the Board of Commissioners. Commissioner Droscha seconded. Motion carried by unanimous roll call vote.

Michael Armitage, Central Dispatch Director, was present to provide the Department's monthly report. Information was provided on call volumes, staff training and the filling of staff vacancies. Discussion held.

It was also reported that a lease agreement for radio equipment owned by Olivet Community Schools co-located on a County-owned tower has not been executed. A lease to identify the parties' responsibility has been prepared. Discussion held.

Commissioner Haskell moved to recommend approval of the proposed tower lease agreement with Olivet Community Schools, as presented. Commissioner Whitacre seconded. Motion carried by unanimous roll call vote.

Ryan Wilkinson, Emergency Services Coordinator, provided an update on the County's continued assistance to the Health Department and local agencies in pandemic response and support. It was also reported that an Emergency Management Strategic Plan is under development.

It was reported that the meeting materials included the third quarter 2020 report of drug-related deaths for the Office of County Medical Examiner for the Committee's review and information.

Commissioner Ridge moved to adjourn the meeting at 4:45 p.m. Commissioner Haskell seconded. Motion carried unanimously.

The next regular meeting of the Public Safety Committee will be held on Thursday, February 4, 2021 at 4:00 p.m.

Good Evening John,

In early December of 2020, I was contacted by the superintendent of Maple Valley Public Schools about the SRO contract for the upcoming 2021 year. The school district wanted to continue the contract with Deputy Hansbarger, but was unable to commit because of financial uncertainty with the district. She would prefer to just contract with us on a per diem basis for a couple days a month, because of remote learning and possible truancy issues. I formulated the costs using the what the district paid us for the year 2020, divided by the amount of days worked by Deputy Hansbarger. The per diem rate equates to \$375. We are able to accomplish this because Deputy Hansbarger is used as a vacation relief deputy and he will not be covering shifts on the days that he is with the school district.

Both Sheriff Reich and the superintendent feel this relationship is extremely important to keep our deputies working in the school and the community.

Formula is \$30,000 divided by 80 work days=\$375 per diem.

LEASE

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~~THIS LEASE~~ This Lease (the "Lease") is made as of the 16th day of October, 2014 January, 2021 between Eaton County (the "Lessor"), a Michigan County, whose address is _____ and Olivet Community Schools (the "Lessee"), a Michigan general powers school district, whose address is 255 First Street Olivet, Michigan 49076.

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RECITALS

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- A. Lessee is the owner, operator and licensee of FCC licensed station WQKC334.
- B. Lessor Eaton County is the owner of a communications tower located at 4205 W. West Butterfield Hwy., Highway, Olivet, MI Michigan 49076.
- C. Lessor desires to lease to Lessee and Lessee desires to lease from Lessor space at the Lessor's communications tower, which is further described in Exhibit 1 (the "Leased Site"), for Lessee's Station Equipment.

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WITNESSETH

1. TERM. -The initial ten-year term of this Lease shall be deemed to have commenced on ~~October 16, 2014~~ 2021 and shall end on ~~October 16, 2024~~ 2031 (the "Initial Term"). This Lease shall renew automatically for an additional term of ten years (the "Renewal Term"), unless Lessee gives notice of non-renewal to Lessor not less than 90 days prior to the expiration of the Initial Term. Notwithstanding anything herein to the contrary, the Lease may be terminated (a) by Lessee upon 90 days' notice to Lessor.
2. RENT. -The Lessee is a not-for-profit local unit of government. The station (WQKC334) is part of the Lessee's radio system utilized for routine and emergency communication within and between school buildings, as well as with busses used for the transportation of students. Therefore, rent is ~~waived~~ One Dollar (\$1.00). As additional consideration for the Property, the Lessor recognizes the benefit the Lessee's operation of the tower provides to the community and the Lessor.
3. USES OF LESSOR'S PROPERTY. - The Lessee's repeater and transmit combiner port equipment and related accessories (collectively the "Station Equipment") purchased by the Lessee and installed at the Lessor's communications tower will at all times remain the property of the Lessee. Lessee shall use the Station Equipment and Lessor's Property only for operation of the Lessee Station. -Such operations shall be conducted in accordance with the standards imposed by the Federal Communications Commission and any other body with authority over such transmission and operation.

Commented [1]: An enforceable contract requires "consideration"; hence, the added language. While One Dollar (\$1) is considered nominal consideration, it will be presumed permissible unless challenged.

Lessor operates public safety communication equipment on the Lessor's property, and may add other public safety communication equipment in the future. Any

interference caused by the Lessee's operation to the currently existing or future public safety communications equipment shall be the Lessee's responsibility to reasonably resolve at the Lessee's expense. If such interference occurs and is not reduced to levels reasonably acceptable to Lessor, Lessee shall promptly cause the cessation of the offending non-public safety ~~tenant's~~ Lessee's operation(s) causing interference to Lessor's transmission. As an alternative to enforcing Lessee's obligation to cause the cessation of the interference, Lessor may elect to terminate this Lease and remove the Station Equipment by giving 90 days' prior written notice to Lessee. If Lessee terminates and removes the Station Equipment pursuant to this provision, it has no further ~~financial~~ obligation to Lessor.

The sidewalks, entrances, parking areas and other common areas of the building and structure in and upon which the Leased Site is located shall not be obstructed or encumbered by Lessee or used for any Purpose other than ingress and egress to and from the Lessor's Property or for any purpose other than their normal use. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Lessee may use the parking areas surrounding the Leased Site to enable Lessee to operate, maintain and monitor the Station Equipment.

4. PERMITS.- Lessee shall obtain, at its own expense, any and all licenses or permits from such governmental body or agency as shall have jurisdiction in connection with the installation, repair, alteration or replacement of Station Equipment or with any activities of Lessee on the Lessor's Property and shall abide by the terms and provisions of such licenses and permits. -If for any reason any governmental agency shall fail or refuse to issue, extend or renew a license or permit to Lessee or to Lessor to continue using the Leased Site for its intended purposes, then and in that event this Lease may be terminated by Lessee or by Lessor, as the case may be, giving 90 days' notice in writing, and the Lessee shall remove the Station Equipment.
5. LESSEE'S RIGHT OF ACCESS. -Lessor hereby grants to Lessee a non-exclusive right of access at all times to the Lessor's Property to the extent reasonably necessary to enable Lessee to house, operate, maintain and monitor its equipment.
6. UTILITIES. -Lessor shall not be liable for failure to supply electricity to the Leased Site, or for any interruption or deficiency thereof, due to any reason beyond Lessor's control.
7. TAXES. -Lessor shall pay all real estate taxes, assessments or levies assessed or imposed against the land on which the Lessor's Property is located, and all taxes which may be assessed against the Leased Site and any buildings thereon. -Lessee shall pay all personal property and other taxes assessed or imposed against Lessee's equipment or material located on the Lessor's Property.

8. INSURANCE. -Lessee shall assume responsibility for any damage caused directly by its operations at the site. Lessee shall procure and maintain comprehensive public liability-insurance, naming Lessor as an insured as its interest shall appear, covering all of Lessee's operations and activities on the Lessor's Property and on Lessor's land, including but not limited to the operations of outside contractors and the operation of vehicles and equipment, with limitations of not less than \$500,000 for any injury to or death of any one person(s) and \$300,000 for property damage. Each of the foregoing limitations shall be for each occurrence and shall not be an aggregate limit in the policy. Lessee shall also cause any outside contractors to procure Workers Compensation Insurance and to procure Comprehensive Public Liability Insurance complying with the section herein. -A copy of the insurance policies shall be furnished to Lessor.

Commented [2]: I recommend contacting SET SEG to discuss whether it will provide this coverage.

9. MAINTENANCE OF LESSOR'S PROPERTY.- Lessor shall provide to the Lessor's Property (but not to Lessee's equipment housed thereon) all necessary maintenance and repairs, provided, however that when such maintenance and repair is made necessary by or because of the fault or gross negligence of Lessee (reasonable wear and tear excepted), Lessee shall reimburse Lessor for the reasonable cost thereof.

____ Lessee, at its own expense, shall carry out the maintenance of its property, including, but not by way of limitation, the electrical and mechanical maintenance of the Station Equipment, but shall not be responsible for the painting of the Lessor's Property or the maintenance of lights thereon. ~~Maintenance shall be conducted by Lessee in accordance with reasonable engineering standards to assure that at all times Lessee's equipment~~ Notwithstanding the foregoing, when such equipment maintenance and repair is made necessary by or because of the fault or gross negligence of Lessor (reasonable wear and tear excepted). Lessor shall reimburse Lessee for the reasonable cost thereof. Lessee will conduct all reasonable equipment maintenance that it believes is necessary to ensure that at all times Lessee's Station Equipment is in conformance with the requirements of the Federal Communications Commission and all other public authorities with jurisdiction over Lessee.

10. PROPERTY DAMAGE.- In the event that the Lessor's Property is destroyed or damaged by fire, lightning, windstorm, explosion, collapse, aircraft or other vehicle damage or other casualty, Lessor shall reconstruct or repair the Lessor's Property to such good condition as existed before the destruction or damage and give possession to Lessee of the same space leased hereunder, unless within 30 days after such damages or destruction Lessor provides written notice to Lessee of Lessor's decision not to rebuild or repair the Lessor's Property. -In the event Lessor provides such notice, the Lease shall be deemed to be terminated as of the date of the subject destruction or damage. If the Leased Site is in need of such repair or is so damaged by fire, lightning, windstorm, explosion, collapse, aircraft or other vehicle, or other casualty that reconstruction or repair cannot reasonably be

INCIDENT SUMMARY

Emergence

COVID-19 was identified in Wuhan, China in December 2019. COVID-19 is caused by the virus severe acute respiratory syndrome coronavirus 2 (SARS-CoV-2), a new virus in humans causing respiratory illness which can be spread from person-to-person. Early in the outbreak, many patients were reported to have a link to a large seafood and live animal market, however, later cases with no link to the market confirmed person-to-person transmission of the disease. Additionally, travel-related exportation of cases has occurred.

The novel coronavirus (COVID-19) is a respiratory disease that can result in serious illness or death. It is caused by a new strain of coronavirus that had not been previously identified in humans and can easily spread from person to person.

Transmission

COVID-19 is primarily transmitted from person-to-person through respiratory droplets. These droplets are released when someone with COVID-19 sneezes, coughs, or talks. Infectious droplets can land in the mouths or noses of people who are nearby or possibly be inhaled into the lungs. A physical distance of at least 1 meter (3 ft) between persons is suggested by the World Health Organization (WHO) to avoid infection, although some WHO member states have recommended maintaining greater distances whenever possible¹. Respiratory droplets can land on hands, objects or surfaces around the person when they cough or talk, and people can then become infected with COVID-19 from touching hands, objects or surfaces with droplets and then touching their eyes, nose, or mouth. Recent data suggest that there can be transmission of COVID-19 through droplets of those with mild symptoms or those who do not feel ill². Current data do not support long range aerosol transmission of SARS-CoV-2, such as seen with measles or tuberculosis. Short-range inhalation of aerosols is a possibility for COVID-19, as with many respiratory pathogens. However, this cannot easily be distinguished from “droplet” transmission based on epidemiologic patterns. Short-range transmission is a possibility particularly in crowded medical wards and inadequately ventilated spaces³. Certain procedures in health facilities can generate fine aerosols and should be avoided whenever possible

Symptoms

A wide range of symptoms for COVID-19 have been reported⁴. These include:

- Fever or chills
- Cough
- Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
- Fatigue
- Headache
- Nasal congestion or runny nose
- Muscle or body aches
- Sore throat

- New loss of smell or taste
- Nausea or vomiting
- Diarrhea

The estimated incubation period is between 2 and 14 days with a median of 5 days. It is important to note that some people become infected and do not develop any symptoms or feel unwell.

Illness Severity

Despite the important concerns about case fatality rates, most COVID-19 illnesses are – and we expect will continue to be – mild, and most patients will recover spontaneously with some supportive care, especially children and young adults. Data from several countries suggest that 14%-19% are hospitalized and 3%-5% will need intense care unit admission.

People at Higher Risk for Severe Illness

It is important to note that COVID-19 is a new disease, therefore there is limited information regarding risk factors for severe disease. In some cases, people who get COVID-19 can become seriously ill and develop difficulty breathing. These severe complications can lead to death. The risk of severe disease increases steadily as people age. Additionally, those of all ages with underlying medical conditions (including but not limited to heart disease, diabetes, or lung disease) appear to be at higher risk in developing severe COVID-19 compared to those without these conditions. As more data become available, additional risk factors for severe COVID-19 may be identified.

COVID-19: Everyday Preventive Actions

There are a number of ways to prevent the spread of COVID-19 infection. These include:

- Avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth
- Avoid close contact with people who are sick
 - Remember that some people without symptoms can still spread the virus
- Stay at home when you are sick
- Cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue, then dispose of it properly
- Use a face covering when physical distancing is difficult or when going into closed spaces²
 - Physical distancing should be at least 1 meter (3 ft)
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces
- Perform hand hygiene with soap and water or use alcohol-based hand rub
 - Hand Rub should contain at least 60% alcohol²
 - Hand washing should be done for at least 40-60 seconds based on WHO's recommendations

Introduction

Drug-Related Deaths - Defined

We define drug deaths as those which result entirely or partially from the physiologic effects of acute toxicity. Therefore, included here are deaths which resulted from a combination of natural disease and acute intoxication (e.g. lung disease complicated by opioid intoxication). Our definition does not include deaths by violence, in which the violent behavior may have been caused or contributed to by intoxication (e.g. death due to injury from motor vehicle crash in which the at-fault driver was intoxicated). We also do not include deaths related to the effects of chronic substance use (e.g. deaths due to alcoholic liver disease or heart disease which may have been contributed to by chronic cocaine use) if not combined with acute toxicity.

Methods

The majority of the drug deaths reported are due to more than one substance, as you will see in the detailed tables that follow. Often, decedents have even more substances present in their body at the time of death or overdose incident than just the substances listed as having caused or contributed to death. After autopsy and review of records, including toxicology report, the medical examiner assigned to the case determines which of the substances present played a causal role in the death. Thus, there may be substances present in a given case which are not included in the cause of death statement.

Occasionally, intoxicated decedents survive in the hospital for a time prior to death, following acute drug intoxication. In these cases, all efforts are made to obtain and test the earliest blood and urine available from their time in the hospital for the overdose incident, so that the toxicology results reflect what was in the body at the time the overdose occurred.

New information occasionally becomes available after a "final" cause and manner of death was determined, which sometimes, albeit rarely, results in a change to the "final" cause or manner of death. As such, the statistics contained herein may be subject to change at any time.

The extent of toxicology testing is determined by the medical examiner assigned to the case, based upon the circumstances of death. During the period reported, our office used Axis Forensic Toxicology for toxicology testing.¹

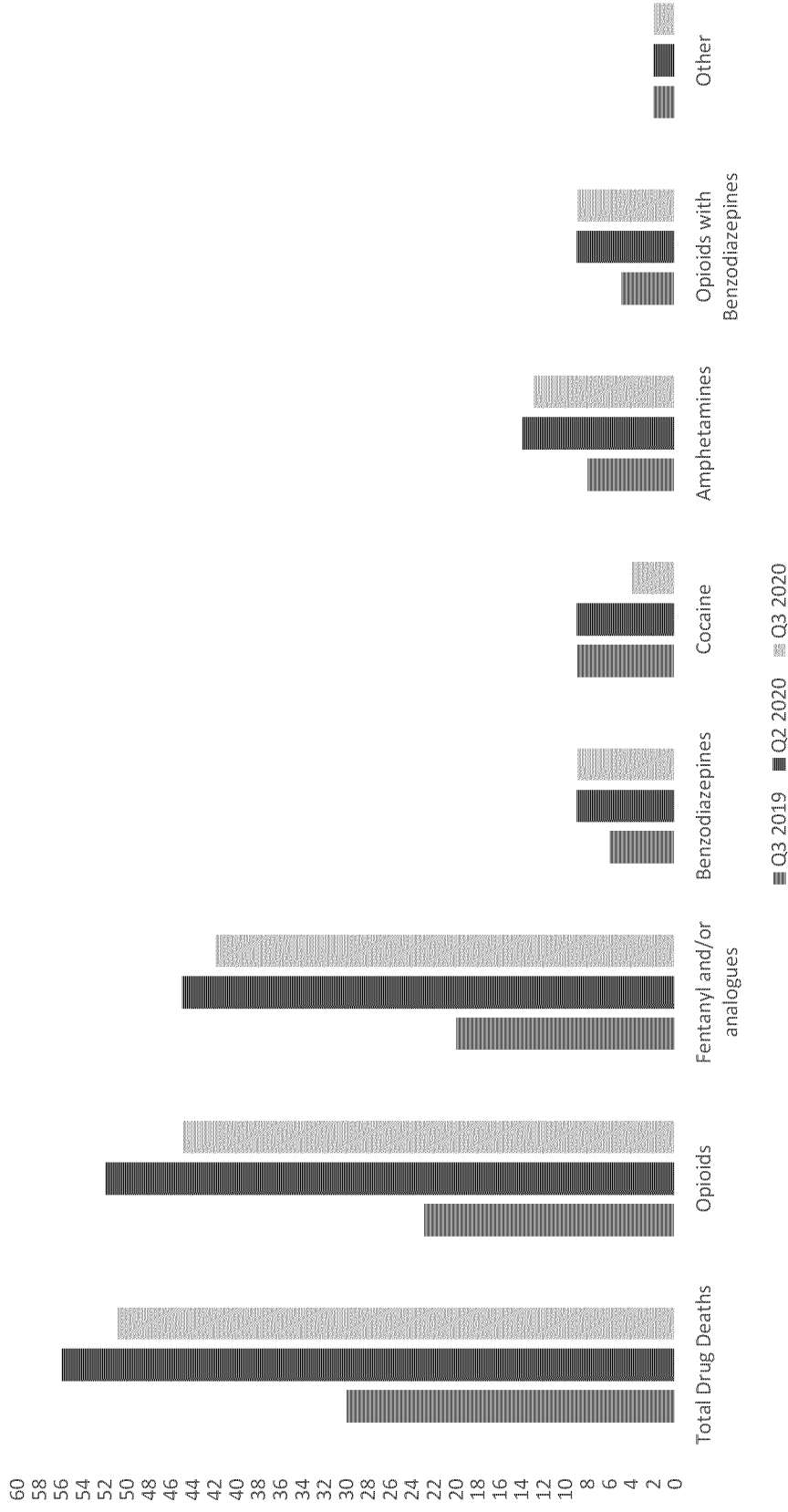
Highlights

All comparisons on the Highlights page are made to the data from Q3 (July 1 to September 30) of 2020. As stated above, most drug-related deaths are due to a combination of more than one substance. As such, numerous deaths fall into multiple of the below statistical categories (i.e. *all* heroin, fentanyl, methadone, and fentanyl analogue-related deaths are included in the opioid-related deaths category).

- Total drug-related deaths **increased** by 70% (21 more)
- Opioid-related deaths **increased** by 95.6% (22 more)
- Fentanyl and/or fentanyl analogue-related deaths **increased** by 110% (22 more)
- Cocaine-related deaths **decreased** by 55% (5 fewer)
- Amphetamine/Methamphetamine-related deaths **increased** by 62.5% (5 more)
- Benzodiazepine-related deaths **increased** by 50% (3 more)
- **20%** of all opioid-related deaths in Q3 2020 also involved at least one benzodiazepine
- **76.5%** of all drug-related deaths in Q3 2020 were due to two or more substances
- **17.8%** of all opioid-related deaths in Q3 2020 also involved ethanol (alcohol)
- **17.6%** of all drug related deaths in Q3 2020 involved ethanol (alcohol)

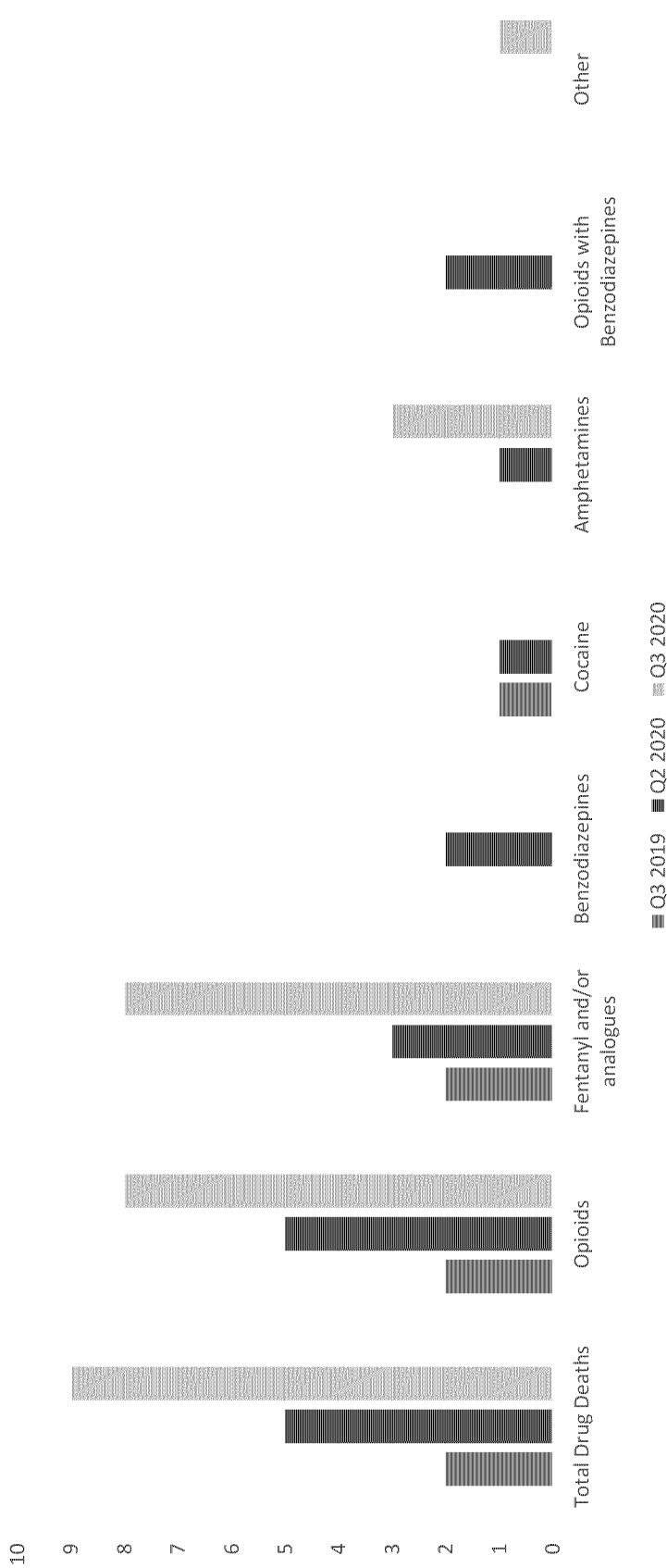

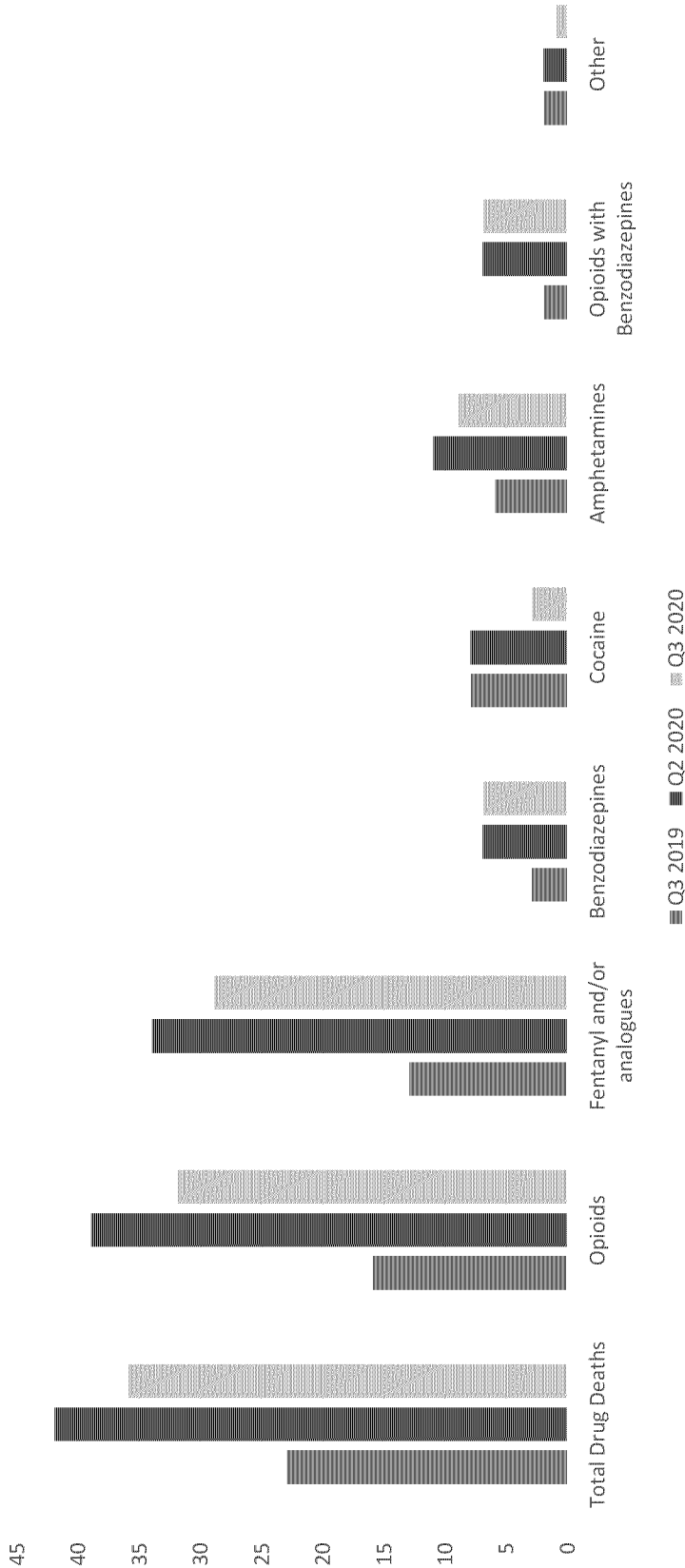

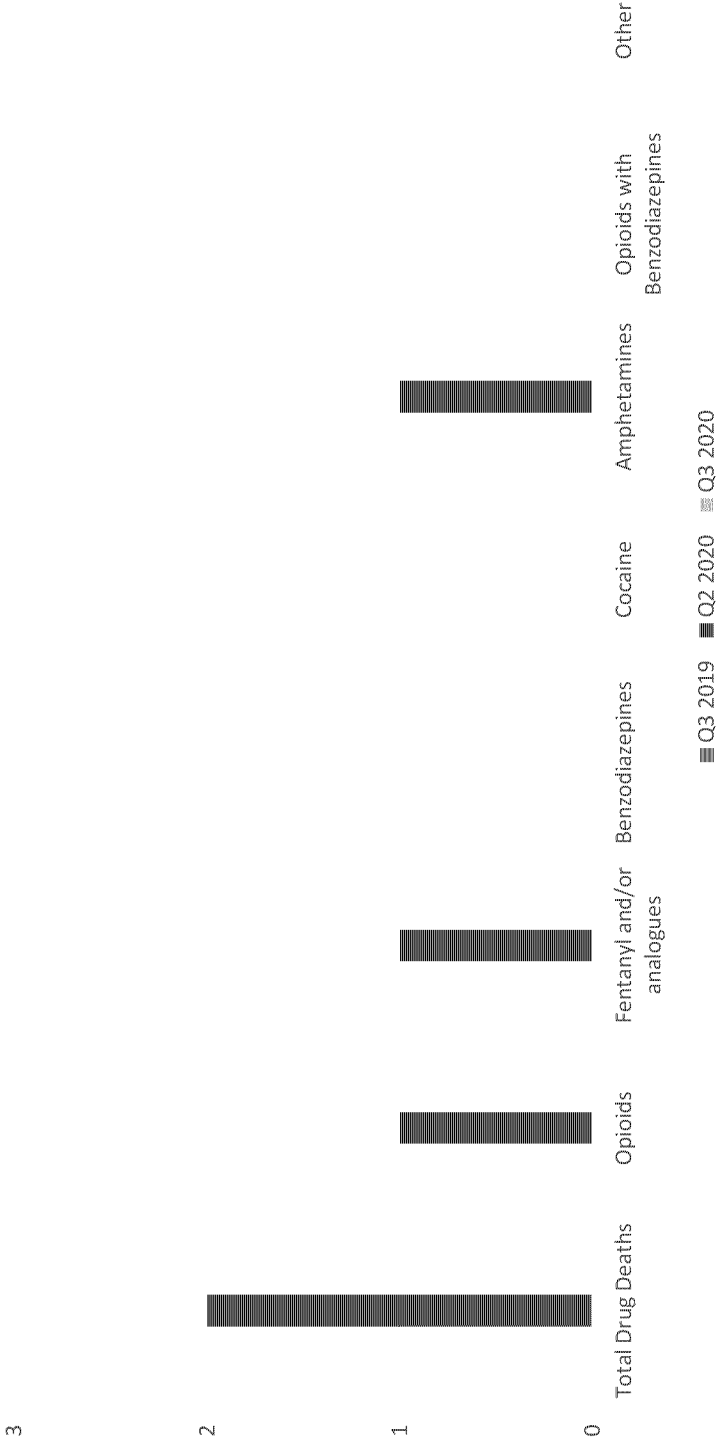

 Q3 2020 compared with Q2 2020 and Q3 2019



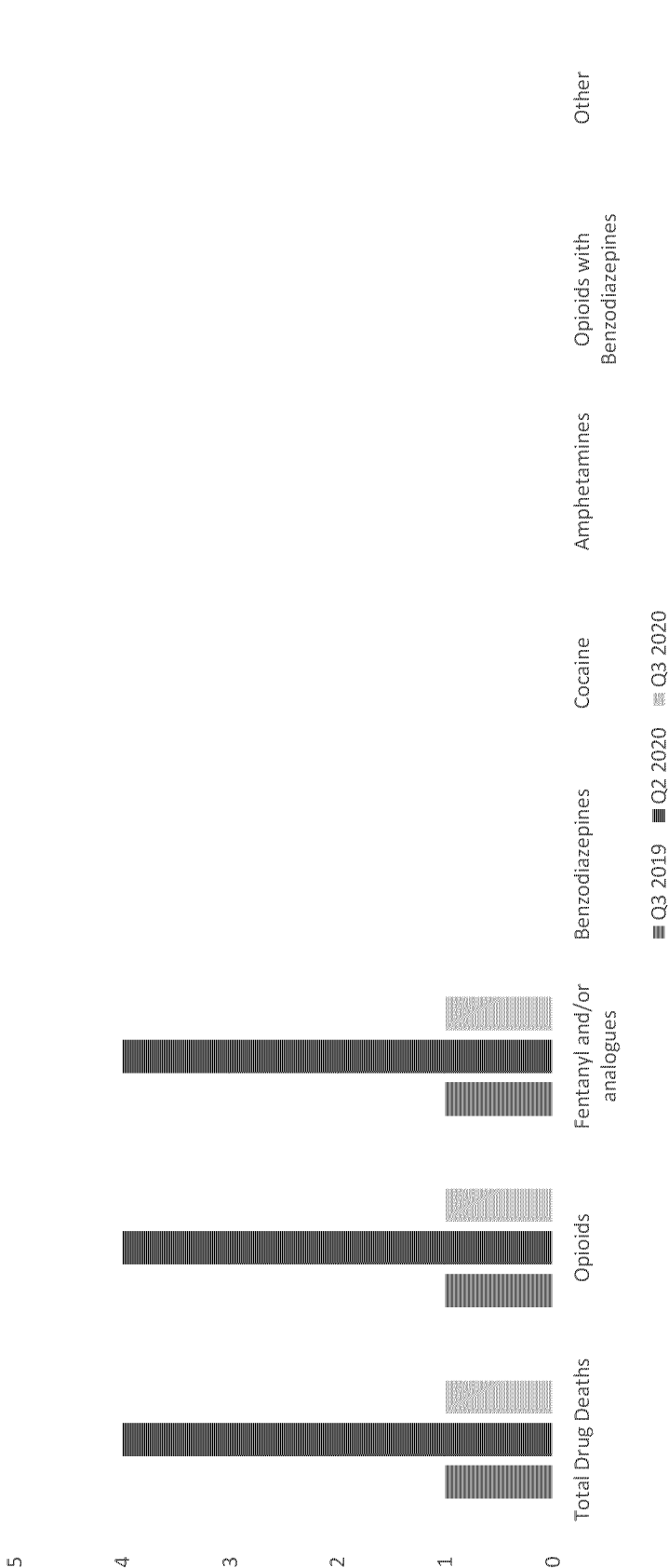

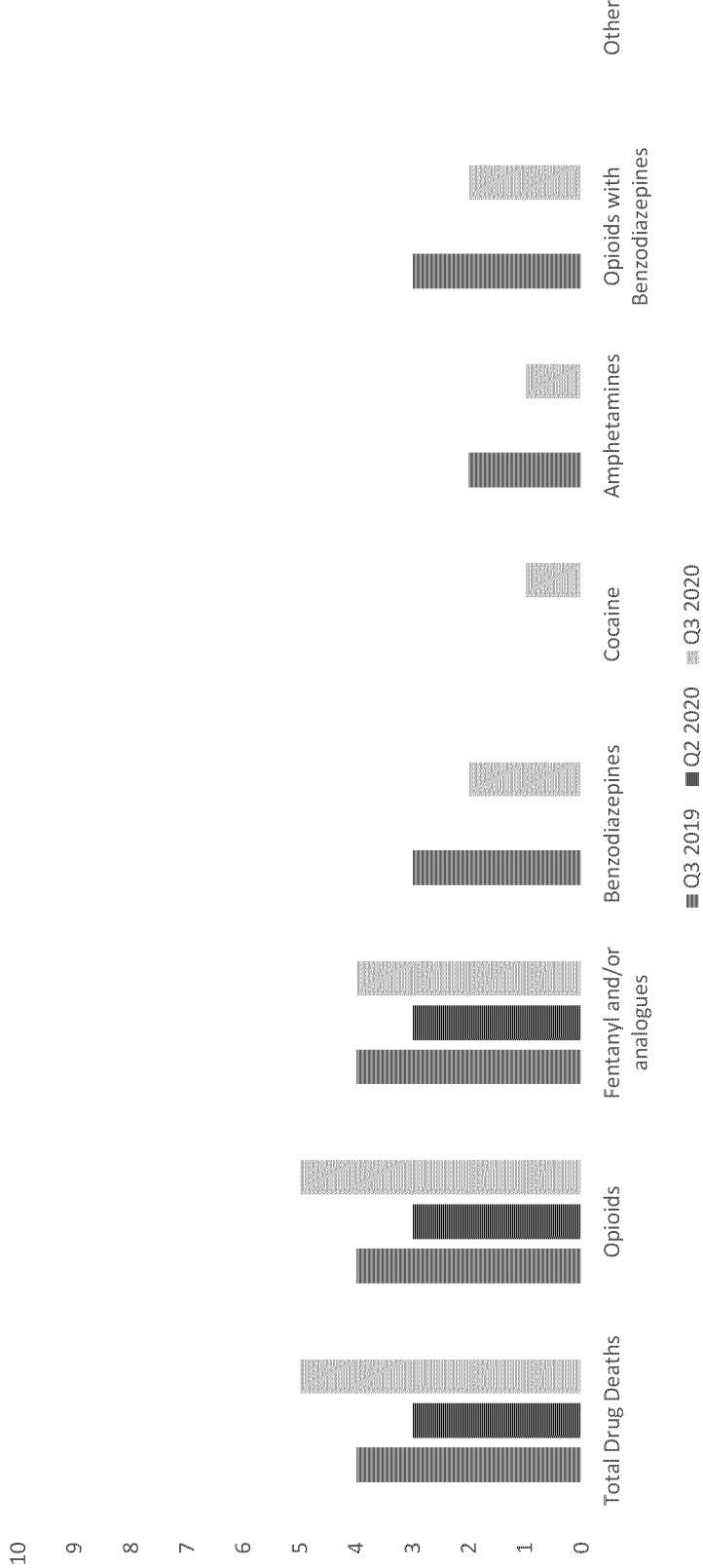
